Maurice Carter Day, 2025! Carter Released from Prison, 2004

July 24. We call it Maurice Carter Day. It was on that day in 2004 that Maurice was freed from prison after having been granted clemency for medical reasons. The photo shows

Maurice stepping into freedom without wearing shackles for the first time in 29 years. Photo credit goes to Dee Horne, wife of Jerry Horne, whose motor home provided transportation for the newly released celebrity.

This photo, which appears on the cover of Doug's book SWEET FREEDOM, was taken by a young Grand Haven Tribune reporter named Matt Tjapkes. The youngest son of Doug and Marcia Tjapkes later went on to become HFP's second CEO (we've only had three!).



The date has additional significance in that it is Matt's birthday!

The Maurice Carter/Doug Tjapkes story is not only the topic for Doug's book. It is also the plot in a stage play created by award-winning Toronto playwrights Donald Molnar and Alicia Payne, entitled JUSTICE FOR MAURICE HENRY CARTER (see story on next page), and the topic for a documentary produced by award-winning Grand Rapids filmmaker Nate Roels entitled WRONGED — THE STORY OF MAURICE CARTER.

Carter, of Gary, Indiana, had been wrongly convicted in Michigan and spent 29 years in our state prison system. He is credited with encouraging Doug to form our agency, now known as HUMANITY FOR PRISONERS, in 2001. Maurice died exactly three months after his release. HFP observes its 24th birthday next month.

From the Desk of Doug The Carter story No Longer Obscure!



Maurice Carter met relatively few people in his life.

He was born and raised in poverty in Gary, Indiana. He was arrested and wrongly convicted as a young man in

Michigan, and spent the next 29 years behind bars. After spending nearly half of his life in prison Maurice was released. But, he was so ill he died exactly three months later.

And yet, as he looks down on us today, he must be pleased! The name and the story of Maurice Carter are now significant.

- Tattered copies of my book SWEET FREEDOM, telling the story of our 10-year battle that drew international attention, still gets passed from inmate to inmate.
- A copy of the book was loaned to Mark Hartman during his 12-year stay behind bars. Mark is now the CEO of HFP!
- The book led Canadian playwrights Donald Molnar and Alicia Payne to create JUSTICE FOR MAURICE HENRY CARTER, now featured in a major Toronto theatre festival.
- Maurice's wrongful conviction led to the production of the documentary WRONGED
 THE MAURICE CARTER STORY, created

by Grand Rapids filmmaker Nate Roels.

- Maurice's idea of helping other prisoners in need led to the formation of HUMANITY FOR PRISONERS, which is now a key force for prisoner advocacy in the state of Michigan.
