HFP: Endowment Fund Revived!

Several years ago the HFP Board of Directors, looking at long-term financial sustainability, formed an endowment fund in cooperation with the Grand Haven Area Community Foundation. It remained dormant until recently. HFP is excited to announce that one of our generous supporters has also expressed an interest in investing for the future. This kind person has committed \$100,000 to our endowment fund, which will yield a \$4,000 per year gift, in perpetuity. HFP: Helping Sexually Abused Prisoners



We are pleased to be collaborating with Just Detention International, which

operates an emotional support hotline for people at MDOC prisons who are survivors of sexual abuse and sexual harassment (not just while incarcerated, but at any point in their lives).

"An Inside Line," the sexual abuse and sexual harassment support line, can be reached by dialing 1 for English or 2 for Spanish, then *HELP (*4357) to be connected to a counselor. They are available to all survivors of sexual abuse and sexual harassment, and anyone looking for emotional support and information related to sexual violence. Calls are free, confidential, unmonitored, unrecorded and anonymous. Just Detention International is an independent health and human rights organization, and the counselors who answer this line do not work for the Michigan Department of Corrections (MDOC). What is shared with them on the hotline does not get reported back to MDOC and reporting is not required in order to access their services.


HFP: Thanks and Support from a Prisoner

Prison Racism Comment from U of M Study:

Racism in prison is daily in every facility in Michigan. "In the chow hall has a white side where most of all of the whites sit and a Black side with all the Blacks sit. But the whites barely get shake down leaving when the Blacks are targeted daily. Especially on chicken day, stereotyping us with the saying, 'you know, Blacks love two things: watermelon and chicken.'"

Posthumous Parole for Maurice?



As a climax to years of intense work on an application to the Michigan Parole Board, a group of criminal justice students at the University of Michigan filed a petition seeking a posthumous parole for Maurice Carter. For those

not familiar with that name, Maurice was a friend of HFP founder Doug Tjapkes, and it was his persistence that prompted the formation of our agency. Maurice served 29 years for a crime he did not commit. He died three months after receiving a compassionate release in 2004.
